Top 10% Rule

- With the exception of UT Austin, public universities in Texas award automatic admission to any applicant who graduates in the top 10% of the senior class
- UT Austin automatically admits students who rank in the top 6%
- SACS is a non-ranking school; however, in January of a junior's academic year, those students who rank in the top 10% will be notified
- Don't Worry; the other 90% Get into College, Too!
- Rank for the top 10% will be calculated at these times:
 - End of junior year (June)
 - Beginning of senior year (September)
 - After the fall of senior year (January)

Grading Scale: Grades are recorded as letter grades on the transcript. Grade Point Averages are recorded on a weighted 4.3 scale.

Grade Point Average Calculation

- GPA is calculated based upon semester grades in all classes from the beginning of ninth grade.
- Honors classes are given an extra
 0.5
 - Example: Honors English: 4.3 becomes 4.8
- Dual Credit classes are given an extra 1.0
 - Example: English 11 Dual
 Credit: 4.3 becomes 5.3

English 11 Dual Credit

- 90 in English 10 Honors AND 3.0 GPA (Le Tourneau requirement)
- Additional fee per semester (currently \$270)

English 12 Dual Credit

- Must earn credit for English 11 Dual Credit
- Must have a 3.0 GPA (Le Tourneau requirement)
- Additional fee per semester (currently \$270)

Prerequisites for Honors/Dual Credit Classes: US History, Government, and Economics

- US History Dual Credit—taken in 11th grade
 - 90 in W History II Honors or 93 in W History II AND 90 in English 10 Honors or 93 in English 10
- US Government Dual Credit—taken in 12th grade/semester class
 - 90 in English 11 Dual Credit or 93 in English 11 AND 90 in US
 History Dual Credit or 93 in US History
 - 3.0 GPA—Le Tourneau requirement
- Economics Honors—taken in 12th grade/semester class
 - 90 in English 11 Dual Credit or 93 in English 11 AND 90 in US History Dual Credit or 93 in US History

Physics AP

- 83 in Chemistry Honors or 93 in Chemistry
- Must be enrolled in Pre-Cal or higher math
- 83 in Biology Honors and Chemistry Honors OR
 93 in both Biology & Chemistry
- 83 in Biology, Chemistry, and Physics and teacher approval
- 3.0 GPA (Le Tourneau University requirement)
- Earns college credit for Biology 1013 Life Science and Biology 1011 (lab)
- Physics I Honors or 85 in Physics, 85 in Chemistry Honors AND 90 average in Algebra II
- Must be enrolled in Pre-Cal or Pre-Cal AP
- Additional fee to include cost of AP exam (students are required to take the AP exam)
- Students interested in engineering, architecture, or computer science career are encouraged to take this course

Other Dual Credit Opportunities

- Students can take 1-2 dual credit classes during the summers before their junior and/or senior year.
- Classes can <u>only</u> be taken with Le Tourneau University.
- Students can also take 1 dual credit class online during their junior/senior year.

Useful Tips to Reinforce at Home: Encourage Your Child To. . .

- Have good attendance (90% rule)
- Have a positive attitude
- Set long term and short-term goals-their goals... Not yours
- Get Organized:
 - Use an academic planner
 - Keep binder, backpack, and folders organized
 - Make a To Do list each day & establish a routine
- Find a study buddy in each class
- Use the tutoring time after school
- Use Canvas to check on assignments and future ones
- Study for tests ahead of time

- Extracurricular involvement is seen as one indicator of success
- Involvement in school and community activities
 - Builds connections and leadership skills
 - Develops time management skills
 - Strengthens the high school resume

- Didn't find a club that interests you? Start your own!
- Encourage your child to start recording an activity log

Tips for Parents

- Communicate with teachers via email
- Remember grading cycles and check the portal weekly
- Applaud their effort not their performance
- Allow mistakes. . .teaches resilience. . .and when they make bad choices, we want them to come to us. . .so choose your battles
- Praise perseverance
- Monitor your child's social media accounts (or eliminate them!)
- Be a role model:
 - Let your kids see you read, reduce your screen time, admit mistakes and show how you work toward solving them

- Could be offered credit recovery on Canvas
- Repeat the course in summer school

3 Things Kids Fear

Rejection

- Sadly, it is a part of life
- Provide unconditional love and acceptance at home
- After listening and empathizing, offer perspective

Uncertainty

- Every day brings new challenges in their social world
- Offer stability at home by being available to listen

Being the Target

- People can be mean
- Listen, count to 10, empathize, ask what their solution might be
- Share times when it happened to you

What Teens Need Most From Parents:

- Dependability & Unconditional Love
 - Be available, listen, validate their feelings, never let the home be a place of rejection
- Praise
 - Compliment honestly and often
 - Look for opportunities to be positive and encouraging
- Appreciation for their uniqueness
 - Express your happiness in them as individuals
 - Have expectations for your child-let them know you have confidence in them
- Show trust yet provide boundaries
 - Give them choices/responsibilities gradually
 - Follow through on rules but be ready to explain the "why"
- Reality Checks
 - Make them accountable for their choices, but use as a learning tool
- Financial responsibility
 - Create a budget with them
 - Encourage and support them, but don't bail them out

Your Job as a Parent:

- Spiritual:
 - Help make it real
- Academics:
 - Trust, but Verify
 - Accentuate the positive
- Social:
 - Get to know their friends
 - Respond with an open heart...separate behavior from the teen
 - Let them know you think they are capable and good
- Emotional:
 - Make room for the blues.
 - Be available to listen... whenever
